

USS S-28 (SS 133)

Lost on July 4, 1944 with the loss of 49 crew members. She was conducting training exercises off Hawaii with the US Coast Guard Cutter Reliance. After S-28 dove for a practice torpedo approach, Reliance lost contact. No distress signal or explosion was heard. Two days later, an oil slick was found near where S-28. The exact cause of her loss remains a mystery.

USS Robalo (SS 273)

Lost on July 26, 1944 with the loss of 81 crew members while on her 3rd war patrol. She struck a mine about 2 miles off the coast of Palawan. Four men survived and swam ashore, then were imprisoned by the Japanese. Unfortunately, they were put on a Japanese destroyer and lost when that destroyer was sunk.

USS Grunion (SS 216)

Lost on July 30, 1942 with the loss of 70 crew members while on her first war patrol near Kiska Harbor. She radioed that she sank two sub-chasers and damaged a third, but was never heard from again.





Russia's Submarine Fleet In The Pacific Should Make The Navy Sweat

Russia's Pacific Fleet is reportedly slated to receive three new submarines in 2022. According to <u>Russian</u> <u>state media</u>, the <u>Borei-class ballistic missile submarine</u> Knyaz Oleg, the <u>Yasen-M</u>-class nuclear submarine Novosibirsk, and the diesel-electric attack submarine Magadan is slated to join the Pacific Fleet's submarine contingent.

A lot of responsibility

The Pacific Fleet has the largest area of responsibility of any of Russia's fleets, encompassing the entirety of the Pacific and Indian Oceans and an eastern portion of the Russian Arctic. In the lead-up to Russia's war in Ukraine, the Pacific Fleet's cruiser *Varyag* and destroyer *Admiral Tributs*, as well as the supply ship *Boris Botuma*, were <u>dispatched</u> to the Eastern Mediterranean to support Russian operations there. However, the Russian Pacific Fleet's involvement in Moscow's invasion of Ukraine has been relatively limited. The fleet did apparently lend logistical help in moving equipment from Russia's far-flung Kuril Islands to the Russian mainland for transport to Ukraine.

The Russian Pacific Fleet is smaller than its Soviet predecessor. But it has grown in recent years, and it brings together a mix of modern and legacy Soviet ships. As of April 2022, the fleet officially <u>includes</u> 53 surface warships and 23 submarines, including the three set to join this year. While the *Knyaz Oleg, Novosibirsk*, and *Magadan* have already been assigned, they have not necessarily traveled to the Pacific Fleet's home base or its area of responsibility yet.

While Russia's most recent <u>Maritime Doctrine</u> places a high emphasis on the Pacific Fleet's ability to defensively secure Russian interests in the Pacific and Indian Oceans, the additional deployment of Borei and Yasen-M ships appears to raise questions about those doctrinal aims. After all, these ships can take the fight to distant enemies by serving as nuclear-ballistic and cruise-missile submarines.

The new submarine additions

The *Knyaz Oleg* is a nuclear-powered, ballistic-missile <u>Borei-A</u>-class submarine. The Borei-A class is an iteration of the standard Borei class. They are larger and more advanced than their predecessors. Built by Sevmash in Severodvinsk, the *Knyaz Oleg* is the fifth Borei-A submarine to be produced. The submarine

is <u>powered</u> by an OK-650 nuclear reactor. It is designed to carry 16 Bulava submarine-launched ballistic missiles and has six torpedo tubes capable of carrying RPK-2 Vyuga anti-submarine missiles. Potentially hinting at a future service life of covering Russia's eastern Arctic zone of responsibility, the *Knyaz Oleg* has been conducting a series of training exercises on the use of its <u>Bulava missiles</u>, as well as the <u>firing</u> of torpedoes to break holes in Arctic ice for the submarine's emersion.

Accepted into the Russian Navy <u>simultaneously</u> with the *Knyaz Oleg* at a December 2021 ceremony virtually attended by Russian President Vladimir Putin, the Yasen-M-class *Novosibirsk* is another nuclear-powered submarine. <u>Equipped</u> with a KTP-6 monoblock reactor, the *Novosibirsk* and its Yasen-M sisters are some of the quietest vessels in Russian service today, and they can carry a combination of <u>Kalibr ground attack missiles</u> and Zircon or Oniks anti-ship missiles. Unlike the Borei-A-class submarines, the *Novosibirsk* is a guided-missile submarine. The two classes of submarine would play different roles in a hypothetical conflict.

Despite not being nuclear-powered like the *Novosibirsk or the Knyaz Oleg*, the *Magadan* is designed to fulfill a similar role. The *Magadan* is an example of the Project 636.3 Kilo class of attack submarines, and it was <u>commissioned</u> into the Russian Navy in October 2021 as the third of six such submarines ordered for the Pacific Fleet. As a Project 636.3 class, the *Magadan* is <u>powered</u> by a diesel electric system and can carry Kalibr ground attack and anti-ship missiles, as well as a variety of Strela and Igla air-defense missiles. Kilos such as the Magadan are also believed to be some of the quietest diesel-electric submarines in the world.

As Russia continues to deliver submarines to its Pacific Fleet, the command will likely continue to rely on a variety of nimbler vessels as part of its expansive mission of securing Russian interests in the Pacific, Indian, and Arctic Oceans.

Typhoon-Class: Why Russia Built The Largest Submarine Ever

The Typhoon-Class, a Short History – Fans of *The Hunt for Red October, whether the* <u>original bestselling</u> <u>novel</u> by the late great Tom Clancy (R.I.P.) and/or the <u>blockbuster film adaptation</u> starring the late great Oscar

winner <u>Sir Sean Connery</u> (R.I.P. again) are bound to be at least somewhat familiar with the massive Sovietdesigned "Typhoon"-class killer submarine. The Typhoon-class boat also figures prominently in a <u>lesser-</u> <u>known Clancy novel</u>, SSN – co-authored with Martin Greenberg back in 2000 – wherein Mr. Clancy harped upon how difficult it would be to sink this particular make of Russian sub due to its double pressure hulls <u>built</u> <u>of titanium</u>. However, as fact-filled as Tom Clancy's novels are, they're still fiction, so now let's take a deeper dive (yes, bad submarine pun intended) into the real facts and history of this submerged behemoth.

Typhoon-Class: The Soviets' Whale Shark

The Soviets officially designated this ballistic missile submarine (SSBN) as Project 941 *Akula* ("Shark"), "Typhoon-Class" is the NATO codename. To make matters semantically more confusing – especially for submarine movie buffs – NATO for its part applied "Akula" as a codename for the different Soviet submarine class, the <u>Project 971</u> *Shchuka-B* ("Pike") nuclear hunter-killer submarine (SSN); just for clarification, it's this latter type of "*Akula*" submarine that duels with the fictitious crew of the USS *Alabama* (<u>SSBN-731</u>) in the 1995 movie <u>*Crimson Tide*</u> starring Academy Award winners Gene Hackman and Denzel Washington. For additional differentiation, the Typhoon-Class is the older of the two classes, first built in 1976 whilst the "Pike" was first built in 1983.

Project 941 was designed as the successor to the <u>Delta-class submarines</u> (Project 667B series consisting of four variants). A total of six Typhoons were built between 1976 and 1989, with a seventh specimen planned but eventually canceled. It ended up as the <u>largest submarine class ever built</u>, tipping the proverbial scales at 48,000 tons worth of displacement. The submarine class is nearly two football fields in length at 174.9 meters (574 feet), the better to house its 160-man crew while staying submerged for up to 120 days at a time. The huge boats could plow through the water at a speed of 12-16 knots on the surface and 25-27 knots whilst submerged.

Weapons payload was impressive too: four 533mm (21-inch) torpedoes fore and two 650mm (26-inch) torpedoes aft, and most significantly, a capacity of 20 <u>RSM-52</u> submarine-launched ballistic missiles (SLBMs). The Typhoons were built in response to the U.S. *Ohio*-class <u>guided-missile submarines (SSGN</u>), which weighed in at a mere 19,000-ton displacement. This greater than 2:1 size disparity is explained by my 19FortyFive <u>colleague Caleb Larson</u>:

"According to the U.S. Naval Institute, this massive disparity in size between the American and Soviet/ Russian missiles is due to the differences in <u>plastics</u> industry maturity, which in the United States, was able to create both plastic children's toys, as well as important binders for solid-fuel missile components."

Party Privileges?

Submarine duty is not for the faint of heart or the claustrophobic, as any submariner worth <u>his/her salt</u> knows. For American submariners, one of the big incentives in place to at least partially mitigate this hardship is what is reported to be the <u>best chow in the U.S. Navy</u>. But the Soviet Typhoon/*Akula* took incentives and amenities to a whole 'nother level, downright shocking for the military of a country that prided itself on supposed proletarian egalitarianism (not counting the "Do as we say, not as we do" Party privileges of the <u>USSR's elitist nomenklatura</u> of course): not only a gym but a swimming pool and <u>even a sauna</u>! Mind you, the pools are only 2 meters (6.5 feet) deep and preclude diving and swimming laps, but eh, beggars can't be choosers, especially when the host boat is submerged at the max depth of 500 meters.

The Typhoon-Class Headed for Retirement?

Alas, for aspiring present-day Russian submariners, the opportunities to enjoy these extra underwater perks are becoming few and fewer. Only one Typhoon/Akula remains on active service, that being the <u>Dmitriy</u> <u>Donskoy</u> (named for a 14th-century Prince of Moscow), with two more on laid-up status and three decommissioned altogether. Since 2008, these mechanical sea monsters have been getting slowly but steadily replaced by the <u>Borei-class subs</u>.

<u>#OTD</u> in 1952, the keel of the USS Nautilus (SSN 571), the world's first operational nuclear-powered submarine, was laid by President Harry S. Truman during a ceremony in Groton, Connecticut.

The ceremony served as a marker of the new advancements in technology and the ushering in of what would become the Nuclear Navy.

During the ceremony, President Truman remarked, "I know that all Americans will join me in this. For we are a peaceful people, not a warlike people. We want peace and we work hard for peace. This is a great day for us, a day to celebrate—not because we are starting a new ship for war, but because we are making a great advance in use of atomic energy for peace. We want atomic power to be a boon to all men everywhere, not an instrument for their destruction. Today, we stand on the threshold of a new age of power."

NEWS-01: Voting in the 2022 USSVI National Election instructions

Shipmates,

2022 USSVI NATIONAL ELECTION BEGINS

Voting in the 2022 USSVI National Election will begin at 00:00:01 AM, June 24, 2022. Voting will continue until 2359, August 15, 2022.

Online voting is via the newly reconstituted USSVI website (<u>www.ussubvets.org</u>). When voting begins, the "Vote in Election" button will be available. When you click on the button, you will get to the USSVI National Ballot. Once there, cast your ballot accordingly. There is also space to write in a candidate of your choice.

When you vote, you do so from your primary Base. The Regional Director vote reflects the location of your primary Base. This may be different from the location of your residence. You can only vote for the Regional

Director who represents the location of your primary Base.

There is one (1) Proposed Bylaws change. Vote "YES" or "NO" on the proposed change.

Candidate's Statements and the text of the Proposed Amendment are in the current issue of The American Submariner.

As always, you may vote by paper ballot. I must receive any paper ballots no later than August 10, 2022. This will allow me to count any "last minute" ballots. I will discard any ballots I receive after August 15th.

Mail-in Ballot to:

You must complete your own ballot. We do not allow "proxy voting."

Base Commanders: You may print a supply of paper ballots and distribute them at a Base meeting. However, each member must complete their own ballot. You may collect the ballots and send them to me as a package. I must also receive that package no later than August 10th.

You may also bring a suitable computer to a Base meeting and members may vote using that computer. Again, each member must cast their own online ballot.

My goal is for as many members as possible to vote in our election. Remember: Your vote is your "voice" in our organization's operation.

She burst out of the room and ran down the corridor screaming.


An older doctor stopped her and asked what the problem was; after listening to her story, he calmed her down and sat her in another room.
