

SILENT RUNNING - AUGUST

USS Bullhead (SS 332)

Lost on August 6,1945 with the loss of 84 crew members in the Lombok Strait while on her 3rd war patrol when sunk by a depth charge dropped by a Japanese Army plane. U. S. and British submarines operating in the vicinity were unable to contact Bullhead and it was presumed that she was sunk during Japanese antisubmarine attacks. Bullhead was the last boat lost in WWII.





USS Flier (SS 250)

Lost on August 13,1944, with the loss of 78 crew members while on her 2nd war patrol. Flier was transiting on the surface when she was rocked by a massive explosion (probably a mine) and sank within less than a minute. 13 survivors, some injured, made it into the water and swam to shore. 8 survived and 6 days later friendly natives guided them to a Coast Watcher and they were evacuated by the USS Redfin.





USS S-39 (SS 144)

Lost on August 14,1942 after grounding on a reef south while on her 3rd war patrol. The entire crew was able to get off and rescued by the HMAS Katoomba. S-39 grounded on submerged rocks off Rossel Island and took on a 35° list to port. The crew was rescued. The S-39 was abandoned and left to "break up" on the rocks.





USS Harder (SS 257)

Lost on August 24,1944 with the loss of 79 crew members from a depth charge attack by a minesweeper near Bataan while on her 6th war patrol. Harder had won a Presidential Unit Citation for her first 5 war patrols and CDR Dealey, "a submariner's submariner," was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor posthumously. Harder is tied for 9th in the number of enemy ships sunk.





USS Cochino (SS 345)

Lost on August 26, 1949 after being jolted by a violent polar gale off Norway caused an electrical fire and battery explosion that generated hydrogen and chlorine gasses. In extremely bad weather, men of Cochino and Tusk (SS-426) fought to save the submarine for 14 hours. After a 2nd battery explosion, Abandon Ship was ordered, Cochino sank. Tusk's crew rescued all of Cochino's men except for one civilian engineer. Six sailors from Tusk were lost during the rescue.





USS Pompano (SS 181)

Lost on August 29, 1943 (between Aug 8 and Sept 27) with the loss of 77 men while on her 7th war patrol. Before being lost, she sank two enemy cargo ships. The exact cause of her loss remains unknown, but she probably fell victim to a mine. This boat's last known ship sunk happened on Sept 25th, so she probably hit that mine on or after that date but before Oct 5th, when she was scheduled back at Midway.

"Cybersecurity Tips"

Phishing Attacks Becoming Harder To Detect

Overview

Phishing attacks have become the most common method cyber attackers use to target people at work and at home. Phishing attacks have traditionally been emails sent by cyber attackers to trick you into doing something you should not do, such as opening an infected email attachment, clicking on a malicious link, or sharing your password. While traditional phishing attacks continue today, many cyber attackers are creating advanced phishing emails that are more customized and harder to detect. They are also using technologies such as text messaging, social media, or even telephone calls to engage and fool you. Here are their latest

tricks and how you can spot them.

Cyber Attackers Are Doing Their Research

Phishing emails used to be easier to detect because they were generic messages sent out to millions of random people. Cyber attackers had no idea who would fall victim; they just knew the more emails they sent, the more people they could trick. We could often detect these simpler attacks by looking for odd emails with "Dear Customer" in the beginning, misspellings, or messages that were too good to be true, such as Nigerian princes offering you millions of dollars

Today's cyber attackers are far more sophisticated. They now research their intended victims to create a more customized attack. Instead of sending out a phishing email to five million people, or appearing to be generic emails sent by corporations, they may send it to just five people and tailor the attack to appear to be sent from someone we know. Cyber attackers do this by:

- researching our LinkedIn profiles, what we post on social media, or by using information that is publicly available or found on the Dark Web.
- crafting messages that appear to come from management, coworkers, or vendors you know and work with.
- learning what your hobbies are and sending a message to you pretending to be someone who shares a
 mutual interest.
- determining you have been to a recent conference or just returned from a trip and then crafting an email referencing your travels.

Cyber attackers are actively using other methods to send the same messages, such as texting you or even calling you directly by phone.

How to Detect These More Advanced Phishing Attacks

Because cyber attackers are taking their time and researching their intended victims, it can be more difficult to spot these attacks. The good news is you can still spot them if you know what you are looking for. Ask yourself the following questions before taking action on a suspicious message:

- 1. Does the message create a heightened sense of urgency? Are you being pressured to bypass your organization's security policies? Are you being rushed into making a mistake? The greater the pressure or sense of urgency, the more likely this is an attack.
- 2. Does the email or message make sense? Would the CEO of your company urgently text you asking for help? Does your supervisor really need you to rush out and buy gift cards? Why would your bank or credit card company be asking for personal information they should already have about you? If the message seems odd or out of place, it may be an attack.
- 3. Are you receiving a work-related email from a trusted coworker or perhaps your supervisor, but the email is using a personal email address such as @gmail.com?
- 4. Did you receive an email or message from someone you know, but the wording, tone of voice or signature in the message is wrong and unusual?

If a message seems odd or suspicious, it may be an attack. If you want to confirm if an email or message is legitimate, one option is to call the individual or organization sending you the message with a trusted phone number.

You are by far the best defense. Use common sense.

OLD Business:

"Well!" St. Peter exclaims, "It took me three months to find a priest up here! Do you have any idea how long it's going to take for me to find a lawyer?"





SWEDEN'S NEW BLEKINGE-CLASS SUBMARINE COULD BE RUSSIA'S NIGHTMARE

Sweden's New Blekinge-Class Submarine Could Be Russia's Nightmare - 19FortyFive



Sweden's industrial base is becoming more active in delivering the military hardware that can make the country a leader in readiness as it prepares to join NATO. Indeed, Saab may soon have another hit on its hands. Its next-generation submarine has come one step closer to fruition.

On June 30, the Royal Swedish Navy laid the keel of the A26 Blekinge-class submarine – the lead boat in a class of two. The Blekinge-class can stay submerged for 18 days and is bigger than the Gotlund-class, itself a formidable submarine, which the Blekinge-class will replace toward the end of the decade.

Saab Stakes Its Claim

Saab is excited about the Blekinge-class, and the company's CEO crowed about the virtues of the new sub in an interview with Naval News.

"The submarine competence places Sweden among one of few nations in the world with the capability to build modern and advanced submarines" Saab CEO Micael Johansson said. "The ceremony is not only a milestone for HMS Blekinge, it is also proof that Sweden has regained the capability. We are looking forward to when her sister HMS Skåne will follow in her tracks."

The Blekinge-class has a long way to go before entering service. Final delivery is not expected until 2027 or 2028. Nevertheless, the keel laying is a significant milestone along its acquisition path. It has taken five years of development to get the Blekinge to this point. The Swedish military first ordered the subs in 2015. Construction began in 2017 at the Saab Kockum's shipyard in Karlskrona, where Sweden has built ships for 300

years.

The Swedes Are Serious About Undersea Warfare

The Swedish navy has invested \$840 million into the Blekinge-class program in an effort to improve on the Cold-war era Södermanland-class of diesel electric subs.

The Blekinge-class is planned to be as silent as ever – the Swedes excel in noise cancellation technology for undersea warfare. The Blekinge is conventionally powered, but it will have flexible mountings to help reduce transient noise, withstand shocks, and lessen the chances of detection by an enemy. The sub's frame will better absorb noise, and the air ducts and pipes will be quiet as well.

The Blekinge will be around 217 feet long. It will displace nearly 2,000 tons. These subs will also be able to sneak close to shore to insert teams of special operations forces personnel, and this "multi-mission portal" will also deploy unmanned subs. The Swedes hope the unmanned underwater vehicles use their intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance prowess to swim far ahead and gather targeting data for the Blekinge-class. The robotic craft can extend the range of sonar to give the manned submarine better survivability against enemy subs and destroyers. The drones can use active sonar as the Blekinge stays hidden. If an enemy detects the unmanned sub, the potential destruction of that vessel will not endanger the Blekinge, which could then stealthily exit the area of operations and live to fight another day.

Saab Has Become a Defense Powerhouse

Saab is perhaps better known for automobile production, but the firm has become an adept arms manufacturer in recent years. It has been posting more revenue and profit each quarter. Saab has a plan for what modern undersea warfare will look like during the next 20 years. While the Swedish navy will not dominate with its numbers of submarines, its unmanned subs will serve as a force multiplier. The Blekinge will be a robust and quiet boat that will help keep the Russian navy guessing in the waters of the Baltic Sea and beyond.

Meet Taiwan's 'Most Capable' Weapon Against China – Its 1st Indigenously Developed Submarine To Sink 'Invading Warships'

The Republic of China's (Taiwan) Navy's first indigenous diesel-electric attack submarine (SSK) will be launched next September, the island's CNA news agency reported. It is a decade ahead of the current Chien Lung class submarine purchased from the Netherlands. There are a total of eight submarines in the class of vessels.

The first submarine is being assembled at Kaohsiung City, slated to begin induction in the Republic of China (RoCN) Navy by 2025.

Scarce details based on a previously released scale model show an X-shaped rudder like the one on the Japanese Sōryū and Oyashio-class attack submarines.

The vessels weigh 2,500 tons and are 70 meters in length. A massive transfer of crucial technologies was approved under the President Donald Trump administration, with Reuters reporting that engineers from Korea, India, Canada, and other nations were assisting China Shipbuilding Corporation, Taiwan's national shipbuilder, in the construction of the eight submarines of the class.

The submarine is expected to use US-origin 18 MK-48 Mod-6 1700 kilograms torpedoes and UGM-84L Harpoon missiles in 2020.

According to <u>Navy Recognition</u>, a version of the US Navy's AN/BYG-1 submarine combat management system, used in its nuclear submarines, is being offered to Taiwan, with Lockheed Martin serving as the systems integrator.

The submarine is hoped to add to the asymmetric capabilities that Taiwan would require to withstand an attack by the People's Republic of China (PRC), less focused on meeting the outsized Chinese adversary head -on, instead preventing their landing on the island by laying mines and striking Chinese transports carrying troops, supplies, tanks, and war material.

<u>Major General Sun Lifang</u>, spokesman of the Ministry of National Defense, said at the press conference that the national construction of submarines is one of the significant national defense independent plans.

Apart from the Chien Lung class, Taiwan's current submarine force consists of four submarines: ROCS Hai Lung and ROCS Hai Hu; the World War Two vintage Trench-class submarines ROCS Hai Shih and ROCS Hai Pao were obtained from the US in the 1970s.

The last two were modernized to the Greater Underwater Propulsion Power Program (GUPPY) standard and painstakingly maintained by the Taiwanese Navy to be combat operational.

The submarine's construction plan was boosted after Taiwan's Parliament passed an <u>extra \$8.6 billion</u> spending bill, in response to repeated shows of force by the People's Republic of China (PRC), following 970 Chinese jets flying into its Air Defense Identification Zone (ADIZ) in 2021. This was more than double the 380 carried out in 2020 alone.

Taiwan's Symmetric Vs. China's Asymmetric Threat

Taiwan and its military face the handicap of being saddled with an enormous legacy, defense platforms against the PRC's more asymmetric threats, which include swarms of several thousand small boats, jets, ships, missiles, and drones to overwhelm and swallow any resistance.

Pentagon-commissioned wargames by the RAND Corporation showed the devastating US and Taiwanese defeats before such a Chinese attack.

The EurAsian Times had reported how Taiwan's former Chief of General Staff (CGS) Admiral Lee Hsinmin Overall Defense Concept (ODC), which envisages investing in such very cheap and otherwise simple platforms, was gathering dust owing to political exigencies.

These include extensive inventories of advanced UAVs for target acquisition, data linking, early-warning, mobile radar roles, and tactical reconnaissance; low-cost, short-range precision-guided munitions; stealth fast attack crafts and small missile boats dispersed and hidden across the island's 200 fishing ports; flexible sea mine systems that even non-specialized mine-layers can drop; a massive array of quick reaction short and medium-range surface-to-air missiles; Harpoon Coastal Defense Systems (HCDS) to take out ships; large batteries of its own highly capable Hsiung Feng III land attack-cum-anti-ship missile; Man-Portable Air Defense Systems (MANPAD) and; High-Mobility Artillery Rocket Systems (HIMARS).

Primarily based on 'fighting a swarm with a swarm,' it practically affects a regular military (Taiwan's) fighting a prolonged guerrilla war at a strategic level in a multi-layered campaign of attrition. But Taiwan outrightly implementing such programs means it has to tell its citizens to prepare for such an attack, jeopardizing the ruling Democratic People's Party's (DPP) political fortunes.

Eye-grabbing, menacing-looking F-16 jets, or M-109 Paladin Self-Propelled Howitzers (SPH) serve as a more reliable symbol of security before citizens, unlike low-key platforms like naval attack crafts or drones. Such defense reforms also put the DPP on the warpath with its opposing Kuomintang (KMT) party, which has often favored reuniting and reconciling with China – particularly the Communist Party of China (CPC), its former civil-war era opponent.

Russia Scraps World's Largest Nuclear Submarine: Report

According to a report from Russian state media on Wednesday, the world's largest strategic nuclear ballistic missile submarine has been removed from the Russian naval fleet.

The state-run RIA Novosti news outlet, citing an unnamed Russian defense industry source, said the Dmitry Donskoy, a nuclear ballistic missile submarine that measures nearly 600 feet, has been decommissioned. "The submarine Dmitry Donskoy has been removed from the fleet and is to be scrapped," the source said.

The Typhoon-class submarine, the lead vessel of the Project 941 Akula class of ballistic missile submarines, has been in commission since 1980, the news outlet said.

The 600-foot Oscar II-class Belgorod nuclear submarine, which was commissioned earlier this month, will take Dmitry Donskoy's place as the largest submarine in the world, according to *The Moscow Times*.

The Russian Typhoon class submarine Dmitry Donskoy, which was once the world's largest in active service, has been decommissioned and removed from active service in the Russian Navy, according to a report from Russian state media.OLGA MALTSEVA/AFP/GETTY IMAGES

Naval analyst H I Sutton, citing Open Source Intelligence, said on June 26 that the Dmitry Donskoy was spotted on the surface of the White Sea.

"[Two] largest submarines in the world, Belgorod (K-239) and Dmitriy Donskoi (TK-208) (TYPHOON Class) caught on surface in White Sea," Sutton tweeted. "These subs are ginormous, much bigger than anything in the West, even the US Navy's Ohio Class."

It isn't clear why the two submarines were in the White Sea, close to Russia's northwestern coast.

In January 2021, a military insider source told Russia's state-run news agency TASS that the Russian Navy had no immediate plans to decommission Dmitry Donskoy.

"There are military training events planned for 2021 involving the cruiser. Decommissioning of the submarine is an issue of five years, at least," the source said.

The submarine had been due to be phased out over the coming decades by the new Borei class of nuclear-powered strategic submarines, according to a report from *The National Interest*.

Meanwhile, several unnamed sources in the shipbuilding industry and law enforcement agencies in the north of Russia offered conflicting information to TASS regarding the Dmitry Donskoy, following RIA Novosti's report.

A TASS source in the shipbuilding industry told the news agency that a decision on the future fate of the submarine would be made no earlier than December this year.

"Then the specialists will have to assess the technical condition of the ship and the stock of nuclear fuel," the source said.

"Recent reports about the withdrawal of Dmitry Donskoy from the Russian Navy do not correspond to reality. The ship is currently performing combat training tasks at sea, participating in combat training activities. It will remain in combat formation at least until the end of the year," another source told TASS.

Russian political scientist and military analyst Alexander Khramchikhin told Russian-language news outlet The Insider that vessels such as the Dmitry Donskoy are typically in commission for 20 to 30 years.

"The nuclear submarine 'Dmitry Donskoy' has long been used only as an experimental one. Naturally, it could not be used for military purposes in any way, except as a large-scale nuclear war," said Khramchikhin.

Military expert Alexei Sukonkin told NEWS.ru that the submarine is most likely past its shelf life.

Newsweek has reached out to Russian authorities for comment.

Funding for submarines approved by House

Funding for the continued development of Columbia-class, ballistic missile submarines for Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay is included in a measure passed by the lower chamber of Congress.

The funding is part of the 2023 National Defense Authorization Act approved by the U.S. House.

The new vessels will replace the aging fleet of Ohio-class submarines ported at Kings Bay and at the base in Bangor, Wash.

Kings Bay is currently undergoing a major renovation at a cost of more than \$1 billion to prepare the infrastructure for the new boats. They are expected to begin arriving later this decade.

U.S. Rep. Buddy Carter, R-1, praised the legislation approved by both sides of the House. Kings Bay, in southeastern Camden County, is in Carter's district.

"An unprepared military benefits no one but our enemies," Carter said. "By upgrading the submarine fleet at Kings Bay, we are bolstering the First District's military prowess and investing in the people who invest in our nation's security.

"This is an exciting win for our state and the nation. The next generation of submarine pilots have a bright future in Georgia."

Submarine Contractor Sets Sights on Building First US Next-Generation Nuclear Reactor

(Bloomberg) -- A defense contractor that supplied components for the earliest nuclear submarines will be tapping its military expertise to enter the race to build the next generation of nuclear reactors.

BWX Technologies Inc. expects to complete a working prototype of a small, advanced reactor under a \$300-million contract with the US Department of Defense. Providing power plants to the military will facilitate the company's efforts to build a commercial version that could be ready by the end of the decade, according to Joe Miller, president of BWX's advanced technologies unit.

BWX is part of a wave of companies developing small nuclear plants that are expected to be faster and cheaper to build than the conventional reactors widely used today. While there's a growing sense that these advanced reactors could offer a key tool in the fight against climate change, the technology remains unproven and there are daunting hurdles in bringing it to market.

Still, the Lynchburg, Virginia-based company says that having a working system will help when it eventually seeks government approval for a commercial design. Its efforts are building on a long legacy of nuclear projects that originated within the military before shifting to civilian use.

"The whole nuclear industry is a creation of the military," Chris Gadomski, lead nuclear analyst for BloombergNEF, said in a Monday interview. "It's a very smart strategy."

The BWX reactor will have 1 to 5 megawatts of capacity, far smaller than commercial reactors operated by utilities that are typically about 1,000 megawatts. It will be small enough to deliver in four standard shipping containers and can be assembled on-site, Miller said in one of the first in-depth interviews since the deal was announced in June. The reactor can run for three years without being refueled—a major advantage over the 750-kilowatt diesel generators it's expected to replace—and could power a wide variety of military sites including bases, ports or hospitals. Some facilities might use more than one system.

While there's growing interest in carbon-free nuclear power as a key tool in the battle against climate change, there's also concern that building new conventional reactors can be costly and slow. The next generation of small plants is expected to address those issues, but the technology is still years away from becoming a reality.

BWX has been working on nuclear technology for decades. The company provided components for the Manhattan Project in the 1940s that developed the first atomic bombs. In the 1950s, it designed parts for the first nuclear submarine and then manufactured components of the world's first commercial reactor in Shippingport, Pennsylvania. Today, the firm supplies a variety of nuclear products and services for government and civilian projects, including naval vessels.

BWX expects to deliver the prototype to Idaho National Laboratory for testing in 2024, and it will likely be the first such small reactor in the US. Testing may take up to two years, and if all goes well, any branch of the military will be able to start using it in the field. The company plans to develop a commercial version of the reactor, a process that will probably require a few additional years to complete, putting it on track for use around 2030.

One of the major challenges will be securing the required US Nuclear Regulatory Commission permit, though Miller said having military systems in operation would validate the technology and provide "a huge leap forward in the licensing process."

There Is A Unique Military Relic Hiding In The Small Town Of Portsmouth, New Hampshire And The History Is Fascinating

While most Americans likely know about the countless battlefields scattered throughout the United States – Gettysburg, Vicksburg, and Antietam to name just a few – these same people might not be familiar with the many decommissioned Navy submarines open for tours around the country. These vessels give visitors an opportunity to learn about another more-hidden side of American military history. One place where you can see a former member of the U.S. Navy fleet is Portsmouth, New Hampshire, home to the USS Albacore.

The USS Albacore was built in the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard - which, due to border disputes between Maine and New Hampshire, is now located within the former's jurisdiction - between 1952 and 1953. The submarine served the Navy from 1953 to 1972, when she was decommissioned.



The Albacore was never actually involved in any battles, serving instead as a guinea pig for naval experiments. She was a prototype for the Navy's nuclear-powered submarine force and was the first vessel built specifically to operate underwater instead of mainly on top of the water. After she was decommissioned, Portsmouth City Councilman Bill Keefe campaigned vigorously to have the Albacore returned to her place of birth. She finally came back to Portsmouth in 1985 and has been serving as a museum ever since.

When you visit the Albacore, first stop by the visitor center to buy your tickets. Admission is \$9 for adults, \$8 for seniors and military veterans, \$4 for children ages five to fourteen years old, and free for active military members. The museum also offers discounts for families.




As well as serving as the ticketing office, the visitor center also showcases photos and artifacts both from the Albacore and other submarines. You can also find a gift shop within the visitor center that sells books and Albacore-themed items like cups, hats, and shirts.

To the right of the main entrance to the visitor center is the Memorial Garden which contains monuments to the crew members of submarines lost during World War II and the Cold War. One of these monuments memorializes the previous Albacore which is thought to have gone down off of Hokkaido, Japan in November 1944.



A granite dolphin, the symbol of those in the submarine service, is located behind the Albacore monument. There are also several benches located throughout the garden from which visitors can stop and remember those who gave their lives for their country.

After you get your tickets, be sure to check out the propeller field which is also next to the visitor center.



In this area you can view the main propeller from the Albacore as well as several smaller propellers including one from the USS Jack, in service from 1967 to 1990.

The first area of note inside the Albacore is the crew's sleeping quarters in the bow of the submarine. This was one of two main "berthing areas" for enlisted members of the crew and slept 26 servicemen.



You'll notice how tight the sleeping quarters were, especially for those who slept on the top bunks. These bunks were quite close to valves and other equipment.

The next notable stop is at the submarine's control panel. Kids - and kids at heart! - will have fun sitting at the controls, pretending they are operating the vessel and sounding the alarms.



Moving on, you'll eventually reach the Albacore's galley where all the submarine's food was prepared. Cooks, assisted by junior members of the crew, prepared breakfast, lunch, and dinner - as well as "soup down" (soup and sandwiches) and "mid rats" (or midnight rations for watch-standers) - for 55 officers and crewmembers.



Finally, down from the scullery, where everything used to prepare and serve meals was cleaned, is the mess deck.



On the mess deck crew members ate, watched evening movies, wrote letters, and played cards. Servicemen could also just grab a cup of coffee and relax here, too.

Touring the USS *Albacore* is a great, family-friendly way to learn about America's military past. You are able to see how Navy servicemen during the Cold-War era lived and worked aboard a vessel which was one of the

first of its kind. If you are ever in southern New Hampshire do not miss this fun, educational attraction. Woods Hole-based 'Alvin' submarine making underwater exploration history again

Falmouth, Mass. - One of the most recognized and the most widely-used deep-submergence vessels in the world, Woods Hole-based Alvin, is reaching new heights by going to depths it's never reached before.

Last week, <u>Alvin</u> and its crew of three, dove nearly 4 miles down into the Puerto Rico Trench north of San Juan.

"As far as milestones are concerned, this is certainly up there," said Andy Bowen, the director of the <u>National Deep Submergence Facility</u> at <u>Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute</u>.

Bowen said the dive was a critical part of the recertification of Alvin after an 18-month, \$50 million overhaul and upgrade to the sub's capabilities.

"That dive is essentially the sort of crowning achievement of, if you will, this most recent upgrade. The main portion of which involved the addition of a new hull for Alvin," Bowen said.

Beyond increasing Alvin's range, the upgrades put nearly all of the oceans' floors within in reach of the longest operating and most successful human-occupied submersible program in the world.

"The idea that the submersible can now reach the 99% of the sea floor and the ocean above, it is almost certainly going to result in astounding amount of expected discoveries," Bowen said.

Alvin was launched in 1964. In the 58 years since, the little white submarine has conducted <u>almost 5,100 successful dives</u>.

"The milestone dive last week really is critical I think in enabling our scientists to reach a new part of the ocean that to a large degree has been unexplored," Bowen said.

Alvin's most famous and iconic dives was in 1986 when Robert Ballad used the vessel to first explore the wreck of the RMS Titanic.

Please bear in mind this site http://ussubvets.org/home.asp has been posted to serve as an interim until the Blackbaud Website is completed.



"I don't have any," he replied gruffly.


"Mr. Barnes, that is very unusual. How old are you?"
