SILENT RUNNING - FEBRUARY

USS Barbel (SS-316)

Lost on Feb 4, 1945 with the loss of 81 officers and men on her 4th war patrol. Based on Japanese records, she was bombed near the southern entrance to the Palawan Passage. Barbel sent a message reporting that she had been attacked three times by enemy aircraft dropping depth charges and would transmit further information on the following night.



USS Shark I (SS-174)

Lost on Feb 11, 1942 with the loss of 59 officers and men on her 1st war patrol. Shark was the 1st US submarine sunk by enemy surface craft in the Pacific. She was most likely sunk by depth charges.





USS Amberjack (SS-219)

Lost on Feb 16, 1943 with the loss of 72 officers and men on her 3rd war patrol. Off Rabaul, she was attacked by a Japanese patrol plane, attacked by a torpedo boat and then depth charged by a subchaser. She reported having been forced down on the 13th by two destroyers, and that she had recovered an enemy aviator from the water and taken him prisoner. All further messages to the vessel remained unanswered.





USS Grayback (SS-208)

Lost on Feb 27, 1944 with the loss of 80 officers and men on her 10th war patrol. She appears to have been caught on the surface in the East China Sea by a Japanese carrier plane whose bombs made a direct hit. During this patrol she sank 4 ships totaling 21,594 tons and was tied for 11th in the number of ships sunk.



USS Trout (SS-202)

Lost on Feb 29, 1944 with the loss of 81 officers and men on her 11th war patrol. She was sunk by escorts in the middle of the Philippines Basin after sinking a passenger-cargoman and damaging another in a convoy. She carried out several notable special missions, including carrying over two tons of gold bullion out of Corregidor in February 1942. Trout topped off with fuel at Midway and was never heard from again. Japanese records indicate that one of their convoys was attacked by a submarine on 29 February 1944 in the area assigned to Trout. Possibly one of the convoy's escorts sank the Trout.



CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

INSPIRATIONAL. NOT A JOKE

Shared last year on Facebook

"Some years ago, I was stuck on a crosstown bus in New York City during rush hour. Traffic was barely moving. The bus was filled with cold, tired people who were deeply irritated with one another, with the world itself. Two men barked at each other about a shove that might or might not have been intentional. A pregnant woman got on, and nobody offered her a seat. Rage was in the air; no mercy would be found here.

But as the bus approached Seventh Avenue, the driver got on the intercom. "Folks," he said, "I know you have had a rough day and you are frustrated. I can't do anything about the weather or traffic, but here is what I can do. As each one of you gets off the bus, I will reach out my hand to you. As you walk by, drop your troubles into the palm of my hand, okay? Don't take your problems home to your families tonight, just leave them with me. My route goes right by the Hudson River, and when I drive by there later, I will open the window and throw your troubles in the water."

It was as if a spell had lifted. Everyone burst out laughing. Faces gleamed with surprised delight. People who had been pretending for the past hour not to notice each other's existence were suddenly grinning at each other like, is this guy serious?

Oh, he was serious.

At the next stop, just as promised, the driver reached out his hand, palm up, and waited. One by one, all the exiting commuters placed their hand just above his and mimed the gesture of dropping something into his palm. Some people laughed as they did this, some teared up but everyone did it. The driver repeated the same lovely ritual at the next stop, too. And the next. All the way to the river.

We live in a hard world, my friends. Sometimes it is extra difficult to be a human being. Sometimes you have a bad day. Sometimes you have a bad day that lasts for several years. You struggle and fail. You lose jobs, money, friends, faith, and love. You witness horrible events unfolding in the news, and you become fearful and withdrawn. There are times when everything seems cloaked in darkness. You long for the light but don't know where to find it.

But what if you are the light? What if you are the very agent of illumination that a dark situation begs for? That's what this bus driver taught me, that anyone can be the light, at any moment. This guy wasn't some big power player. He wasn't a spiritual leader. He wasn't some media-savvy influencer. He was a bus driver, one of society's most invisible workers. But he possessed real power, and he used it beautifully for our benefit.

When life feels especially grim, or when I feel particularly powerless in the face of the world's troubles, I think of this man and ask myself, "What can I do, right now, to be the light?" Of course, I can't personally end all wars, or solve global warming, or transform vexing people into entirely different creatures. I definitely can't control traffic. But I do have some influence on everyone I brush up against, even if we never speak or learn each other's name.

No matter who you are, or where you are, or how mundane or tough your situation may seem, I believe you can illuminate your world. In fact, I believe this is the only way the world will ever be illuminated, one bright act of grace at a time, all the way to the river."

Do you want to be a part of the building of your Charitable Foundation?

We are searching for a few people to assist your US Submarine Veterans Charitable Foundation to achieve its next plateau. This month we are celebrating 22 years as a 501 (c) 3 charitable organization.

Backup support is critical; we need your assistance.

Our funds, listed in alphabetical order:

Brotherhood

Assist our current Fund Manager, Ken Nichols, with administering the Brotherhood Fund. This is an activity that always covers all bases. When a shipmate suffers, this fund stands by to help in some way. The time involved is generally low, some months with almost no activity. Some months it can be more, depending on what is happening in the country – think of hurricanes, floods, earthquakes, and other disasters. Experience necessary: strong email and phone usage can be helpful. A desire to help is necessary.

Building

We currently have one building, and it is old and in need of updating and modifications. We may need to acquire a new or another building sometime, but this fund supports our Groton Base building for now. The experience needed is a background in commercial building maintenance and modifications. Almost any commercial building experience would be helpful. The time involved is minor. You would be working with our Building Fund Manager, Jon Jacques.

General

The General Fund Manager is the Charitable Foundation's Treasurer. This position is critical, and the time involved is growing. We are looking for someone with experience in bookkeeping and accounting and familiarity with Quickbooks. This puts you in the middle of the operations of the Charitable Foundation. The time involved would be from as little as a few hours per month to a few hours per week. This could consist of a team of treasurer and one or two assistants. You would be working with our Treasurer, Randy Stein.

Legacy

The Legacy Fund is critical to the long-term operation of the Charitable Foundation. We are looking for someone understanding the Time Value of Money. If you understand Endowments, Estates, and the time value of money, then we need you. The time involved is minor almost none, except for the time spent thinking and planning. You would be working with Jon Jacques.

Library

Our library is in North Little Rock, Arkansas, on the Arkansas River. This is, in effect, an archive of books. The backup library Fund Manager should have easy access to this park. The time involved is minimal., working in conjunction with Joe Mathis.

Memorial & Museum Boat

Ray Wewers has been the Memorial & Museum Boat Fund Manager for many years and has a lot of information about how this fund operates. The time involved is small, but from time to time can become focused as various projects come to fruition. Familiarity with project planning and management would be helpful.

Scholarship

Dr. Alan Fickett is the Scholarship Fund Manager. This fund is one of our more active funds, in the past few years, we have awarded several hundred scholarships. We recently added a new concept of Vocational Scholarships, and we anticipate increasing scholarship applications. The time involved can be relatively low for about 6 or 7 months of the year and then quite busy for several months from spring to late summer. Experience should include exposure to scholarships and various schools and universities. This could expand into a team of two or three working alongside Dr. Fickett.

U.S. Naval Undersea Museum

U.S. Navy Submarine Service - SSN's

1/8/2023

On this day in 2005, submarine USS San Francisco (SSN 711) collided with a seamount traveling at flank speed — unaware of mountain's presence because it was missing from the navigation chart being used. The head-on crash ruptured the submarine's forward ballast (buoyancy) tanks and flooded its sonar dome. Machinist's Mate 2nd Class Joseph Ashley died of head trauma and 70 other crew were injured.



With great effort, San Francisco's crew regained positive buoyancy, executed an emergency blow, and kept the sub afloat to return to drydock for temporary repairs. San Francisco survived this terrible accident due to the Submarine Safety (SUBSAFE) Program, which works to ensure that submarines can recover from flooding incidents.

Because San Francisco's pressure hull remained intact and her reactor had been refueled a few years earlier, the U.S. Navy chose to make repairs. The submarine's damaged bow section was replaced with the bow from USS Honolulu (SSN 718), allowing San Francisco to serve for another eight years (and leading to the nick-name "Honofrisco").

The resilient San Francisco is now a moored training ship, MTS 711, at NPTU Charleston.

So, from myself to the rest of the veterans out there, I commend and thank you for all that you have done and sacrificed for your country.


Try to remember the good times and make peace with the bad times.


