USS Herring (SS 233)

Lost on June 1, 1944 with the loss of 83 men near Matsuwa Island. Herring was on her 8th war patrol, conducting a surface attack. Spotted by a shore battery and made 2 direct hits on her conning tower causing her loss. Before being sunk, she had sank a freighter and a passenger-cargoman. Herring was the only US submarine sunk by a land battery.





USS R-12 (SS 89)

Lost on June 12, 1943 with the loss of 42 men near Key West, FL during a practice torpedo approach. The cause was probably due to flooding through a torpedo tube. The CO and 2 other men on the bridge survived, as did 18 crew members on liberty at the time of the accident.





USS Golet (SS 361)

Lost on June 14, 1944 with the loss of 82 men. On her 2nd war patrol, Golet was apparently lost in battle with antisubmarine forces north of Honshu.





USS Bonefish (SS 223)

Lost on June 19, 1945 with the loss of 85 men when sunk near Suzu Misaki. Winner of 3 Navy Unit Citations, Bonefish was on her 8th war patrol. After sinking a passenger-cargoman, Bonefish was subjected to a savage depth charge attack.





USS S-27 (SS 132)

Lost on June 19, 1942 when it grounded off Amchitka Island. She was on the surface in poor visibility, charging batteries and drifted into the shoals. When she could not be freed and started listing, the captain got the entire crew to shore (400 yards away) in relays using a 3-man rubber raft. The entire crew was subsequently rescued.





USS O-9 (SS 70)

Lost on Jun 20, 1941 with the loss of 34 men when it foundered off Isle of Shoals, 15 miles from Portsmouth, NH. O-9 submerged at 0738 to conduct deep submergence tests, the sub did not surface thereafter but was crushed by the pressure of the water 402 feet below.






USS Runner (SS 275)

Lost between June 26 and July 4th with the loss of 78 men. Runner was on her 3rd war patrol probably due to a mine. Prior to her loss, she reported sinking a freighter and a passenger-cargoman off the Kuriles. The boat's last known ship sunk was on June 26th, so she probably hit the mine on or after that date but before July 4th, when she was scheduled back at Midway.

DUTY SECTION TRAINING - PHISHING

As technology becomes more ingrained in our daily lives, it's good to be aware of threats to your electronic livelihood. The most common tactic used by attackers is what's known as "phishing".

What is "phishing"? The title is much like what is actually occurring, an attacker will send out thousands of unsolicited emails to addresses in the hopes that they'll get a bite and catch something that may provide either what they're looking for or will allow them to inch closer to their target.

There are many methods an attacker may attempt depending on what they're using or what hurdles they may be trying to get around. For example, you might think your inbox is safe because you have a Spam filter configured but this isn't always the case. A Spam filter will mostly block "spoofed" emails, or emails you've told it to block. A "spoofed" email is like if someone were to put on someone else's uniform and then attempt to get on the boat. (Example: The sender's address says "support@reallybigbank.com", but the email server that sent it is not from the "reallybigbank.com" domain. It would be like receiving a letter in the mail with a return address in Austin, but looking at the letter's stamp and processing facility shows that it was mailed to you from Brazil.) Hopefully the Topside Watch will tell whoever the fraud attempting to come onboard to kick rocks, as your Spam filter would do.

A common way attackers can get around this limitation is to use a compromised victim's email address to send out the emails for them. Since your spam filter sees the sending email address as legitimate, it will not mark the email as spam and will deliver it to your inbox. If the victim sending the email is a person you have communicated with in the past, you are more likely to let your guard down and fall victim to the trap. (Example: email received from "sqrdawaysailor@gmail.com", and the sender's address is also "sqrdawaysailor@gmail.com".). If you're not expecting something, it's best to never open it!

- Don't keep the same username and password across different accounts.
- (Example, having username@email.com and Pa\$\$word! for your Facebook, Amazon, or Google accounts. If comprised on one, the attacker will try the same credentials everywhere else.)
- Always remember to never open anything you aren't expecting, and if it's from someone you know it's better to give them a call than reply to suspicious emails.
- Using "Multi-Factor Authentication" aka MFA when available will prevent someone from logging into your account with your credentials.
- If you accidentally fall for a phishing email it's best to immediately change your password!



Curious if your email address has shown up in a breach or has been compromised in the past? The following website was created and maintained by a reputable person in the Cyber community, with the sole intention of allowing people to check the security of their accounts, for free.

Simply open the following URL in a web browser, type in your email address, and click "pwned?" to start the search.

https://haveibeenpwned.com/



(pwned is slang for owned, just like your behind if the COB caught you sleeping during field day)

If you've had an email account for some time and used it for various websites and services, there's a good chance it will not have the good news listed above, but no worries.

If it does include compromised results, you'll be provided with additional information, more specifically, if your password or other sensitive account information has been breached.

The U.S. Navy Has a Secret Submarine That No One Knows What It Does

USS Jimmy Carter, A History - There are currently nine aircraft carriers named for former presidents of the United States, while a tenth is now under construction. However, President Jimmy Carter isn't included in the list of former commanders-in-chief to be so honored – rather Carter has the distinction of being recognized for his service as a United States Navy submariner with a Seawolf-class nuclear-powered, fast attack submarine (SSN) named for him. Carter was the only submarine-qualified sailor to go on to become the nation's chief executive. He was the nuclear engineer officer on the Pre-Commissioning Unit Seawolf (SSN 575) in the 1950s.

Enter The New Seawolf-class: USS Jimmy Carter

The new Seawolf-class of the late 1980s vintage was something quite amazing. SSN-23 is the third and <u>final boat of the class</u> – and due to extensive modifications from the original design is even described as a subclass. The boat is the only submarine to be named for a living former president. Laid down in 1998, launched in 2004, and commissioned in 2006, USS Jimmy Carter is one of the most sophisticated attack submarines ever <u>built</u>. Larger and more advanced than her sister boats, SSN-23 has also reportedly been tasked with taking on a number of <u>secretive missions</u> for the U.S. Navy.

Meet the Seawolf

Designed to address the threat of Soviet ballistic missile submarines, and to replace the aging Los Angelesclass of attack submarines, the Seawolf--class of nuclear-powered <u>fast attack submarines</u> (SSN) has been described as the best of the best.

A total of 29 boats were to be constructed over a 10-year period – a number that was then reduced to 12 – but only three were launched. Cost was an issue. The boats also became less necessary with the dissolution of the Soviet Union and the end of the Cold War. It meant they were designed for a foe that no longer existed.

At approximately \$3 - \$3.5 billion per vessel, the boats were simply too expensive, especially in the wake of changing global geopolitics. Instead, the United States Navy opted for the smaller and more cost-effective Virginia-class submarine program. That could turn out to be a huge mistake as the United States is now facing a Cold War 2.0 against near-peer adversaries including <u>Russia</u> and <u>China</u>, which have each engaged in new submarine programs.

The Seawolf Has Claws

The fast attack subs were equipped with an advanced suite of electronics, including a 24-foot diameter spherical sonar array mounted in the bow, a wide-aperture flank array sonar mounted on the sides, and the recently added ability to carry a towed-array sonar. Each of the three SSNs of the Seawolf-class further features a modular design that has allowed for later upgrades including weapons development and better sonar systems, and even today, these remain somewhat "future proof."

The boats lack external weapons, but each was designed with eight torpedo tubes – twice as many as the Los Angeles-class, along with a double-deck torpedo room to allow for simultaneous engagement of multiple threats. It also had a 30 percent increase in weapons magazine providing storeage for a combination of up to 50 Mark 47 heavyweight torpedoes, Sub-Harpoon anti-ship missiles, and Tomahawk missiles.

The Seawolf-class is equipped with a strengthened sail that permits operations under the polar ice cap, and the highest speed of any U.S. submarine. As importantly, the design efforts focused on noise reduction – it was up to 70 times quieter than the initial generation of Los Angeles-class boats and 10 times quieter than the Improved Los Angeles submarines.

The boats were also designed to be true hunters, and could easily seek out the best the Soviet Navy had to offer, including its Akula-class. The Seawolf sonar suite includes a BQQ 5D with bow-mounted active/passive arrays and wide aperture passive flank arrays, along with TB-16 surveillance TB-29 tactical towed arrays – each of the latter able to be upgraded to more advanced hardware. The boats have has been refitted with a Lockheed Martin AN/BQQ-10(V4) sonar processing system under the acoustic-rapid commercial-off-the-shelf insertion (A-RCI) program.

"Always The Best"

Though few – apart from Sean Penn, perhaps – would ever suggest that Jimmy Carter was the "best" president, the motto of the boat to bear his name is actually "Semper Optima" (Latin for "Always the Best"). It is meant to honor his Naval passion.

The USS Jimmy Carter was launched on May 13, 2004, and commissioned for service the following February

19th with a crew of 15 officers and 129 enlisted. Power is supplied from a single S6W series reactor, which provides an unlimited ocean-going range, while she has an underwater speed in excess of 25 knots.

The boat, which is larger than her sister attack submarines, displaces 12,140 tons under full load and is 453 feet in length with a beam that measures 40 feet. The larger size is due to a modification that included adding special thrusters fore and aft that allow the sub to remain stationary underwater, as well as a 100-foot hull extension known as the Multi-Mission Platform (MMP). It allows SSN-23 to carry remotely operated vehicles, cable spools, special-operations craft, and other advanced technologies needed to carry out classified operations and "enhanced warfighting capabilities." The MMP can be used to deploy Navy SEALs or other special operations forces.

The exact types of missions USS Jimmy Carter has conducted in the past 18 years remain classified.

Still, it has been seen returning to port flying the "skull and crossbones," a tradition among submarine crews that its mission was conducted successfully. The boat has Battle Efficiency awards and a Presidential Unit Citation, suggesting it has conducted some important – and likely even dangerous – missions. This may have included tapping undersea fiber-optic communications and conducting intelligence-gathering missions.

Whatever missions SSN-23 has taken part in, it is like the boat and her crew proved they were always the best.

What an Expert Told 19FortyFive

"The Seawolf-class was a quantum leap over the older Los Angeles-class boats for sure, integrating new technology that was not on any U.S. Navy attack submarines before," explained a retired Electric Boat engineer who worked on the Seawolf-class submarine program as they were being designed and built. He spoke to 19FortyFive on background.

"The Navy came to us with a set of very hard-to-match metrics for the sub to hit in terms of stealth, speed, and armaments. We told them that some of the tech to fulfill those needs did not exist yet. They gave us the budget to do just that. And the USS Jimmy Carter was very much in line with that vision."

British Royal Navy submarine files left in a pub bathroom

Do not take documents about nuclear-powered attack submarines to bars.

This is a different kind of leak. A series of files detailing some of the inner workings of the British Royal Navy's nuclear-powered submarine the HMS Anson were found inside the bathroom of a pub in England, soon after a busy night at the bar.

The files were found on the floor of a bathroom stall inside the Furness Railway pub in Barrow-in-Furness, not far from the BAE Systems shipyard in the town. The HMS Anson, an Astute-class nuclear-powered attack submarine, was built there.

The story was originally reported by the British tabloid <u>The Sun</u>, was confirmed in part by the British Royal Navy, which confirmed the veracity of the files. In a statement to the press, the Royal Navy said the files "are generic training documents that carry no classified information."

"However, we take all security matters extremely seriously and will investigate the circumstances of their discovery," the statement continued.

Details on the files, including images shared by The Sun, include documents marked "UK OFFICIAL – SEN-SITIVE" as well as information on the submarine's hydraulics systems. A Royal Navy lanyard was also found next to the files. Per The Sun, the pub was full of both civilians and military members on a "lively" night before the documents were found.

Task & Purpose has not seen the documents beyond what was shared by The Sun.

It's unclear who left the files inside the pub bathroom, and there is no indication they were left as part of an intentional leak or espionage.

The HMS Anson is the fifth of the Royal Navy's Astute-class nuclear-powered submarines. It set sail for the first time in February, to a base in Scotland to undergo trials. It is a hunter-killer submarine, 97 meters in length and equipped with Tomahawk missiles among other armaments.

The Furness Railway pub is located approximately 20 minutes from the shipyard by foot. It was formerly a department store before becoming a pub and images of it show a clean space with framed photos and maps detailing old rail systems and the launching of past Royal Navy ships. This incident appears to be the first time documents tied to a nuclear-powered submarine were left on the premises.

The documents do not appear to be anywhere as massive as the leak of U.S. military documents discovered this month on two Discord servers, allegedly by Air National Guardsman Jack Teixeira. However, the Astute-class submarines are among the Royal Navy's latest vessels. When the HMS Anson set sail for the first time in February, the Royal Navy called the Astute submarines "the most advanced boats ever operated by the Royal Navy."

Iceland Allows Resupply Call for U.S. Nuclear Sub for the First Time

The Los Angeles-class fast-attack submarine USS *San Juan* has become the first U.S nuclear-powered ship to sail into Iceland's territorial waters after the Nordic nation temporarily waived a longtime ban.

U.S. Sixth Fleet announced that the submarine made a brief stop for supplies and personnel off Iceland's

west coast while operating in the High North on April 26. It said that the visit is part of an effort to increase regional maritime domain awareness and the safety of underwater infrastructure, such as submarine cables. More importantly, it paves the way for future stops as needed.

The submarine's stopover in Iceland came a week after the nation's government said it will authorize U.S nuclear-powered submarines to make brief service visits off its coast. This marks the first time ever Iceland has allowed U.S nuclear powered submarines in its territorial waters.

"We thank our Icelandic allies for allowing *San Juan* to conduct this brief stop for supplies and personnel in Icelandic waters," said Capt. John Craddock, Commander Task Force 69.

He added that the visit demonstrates the strength of the Iceland-U.S. strategic relationship and the two nations mutual commitment to maritime domain awareness and increased response capabilities in the Arctic and North Atlantic. "The ability to conduct these stops out of Iceland greatly increases our operational flexibility in the Greenland-Iceland-U.K. Gap."

In allowing the visit, Iceland Foreign Ministry emphasized that the submarine will be serviced a few kilometers off the coast, will not carry nuclear weapons and will not make port calls.

"It is a condition for the arrival of allied warships in the country that the governments of the respective countries both know and respect the provisions of Iceland's national security policy that Iceland, and its territorial waters are declared free from nuclear weapons," said Iceland Foreign Ministry in a statement.

While the country has given the nod for the first access to its waters, it has maintained that any frequency of visits will depend on the need at any given time.

Though its neighboring NATO members have always allowed allied nuclear-powered submarines to sail into their territorial waters, Iceland has maintained a tough stance against any visits owing to its uncompromising opposition to nuclear energy and weapons.

Iceland is softening its tough stance while hosting Dynamic Mongoose 2023, a large-scale anti-submarine warfare exercise that started in the North Atlantic on April 24 and runs through May 5. A total of 15 warships from 10 allied nations are participating in the exercise.

The security situation in the North Atlantic area has become a top priority for Iceland following Russia's invasion of Ukraine. The waters around Iceland are a strategic zone for submarine activity, particularly Russian Navy subs coming from the Barents Sea.

Iceland is also a hub for several subsea telecom cables, and the security of subsea infrastructure is at top of mind for NATO. Just last week, a joint report by public broadcasters in Denmark, Norway, Finland and Sweden revealed that Russia has deployed a covert fleet of trawlers and research ships to identify vulnerabilities in the subsea cable network off the coasts of NATO nations. The report detailed a large-scale surveillance operation targeting key communications and electrical transmission infrastructure in the Baltic, the North Sea and the Norwegian Sea.

Concerns that Russia is planning to sabotage critical infrastructures have seen Iceland deepen its bilateral cooperation with the U.S, with the two countries annual Strategic Dialogue taking place in Washington last week. Iceland, with a population of 370,000, does not have an army and only operates a coastguard unit. The country also has an air defense and surveillance system that is integrated into NATO.

Navy to Christen Submarine Massachusetts

The Navy will christen one of its newest Virginia-class fast-attack submarines, the future USS Massachusetts (SSN 798), during an 11 a.m. EST ceremony Saturday, May 6, 2023, at Huntington Ingalls Industries-Newport News Shipbuilding, in Newport News, Virginia.

The principal speaker will be the Honorable Erik Raven, Under Secretary of the Navy. Remarks will also be provided by the Honorable Bobby Scott, U.S. Representative, Virginia's 3rd District; Vice Adm. Scott Conn, Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Warfighting Requirements and Capabilities (N9); Ms. Jennifer Boykin, Newport News Shipbuilding President; and Mr. Kevin Graney, president, General Dynamics Electric Boat.

In a time-honored Navy tradition, the submarine's sponsor, Ms. Sheryl Sandberg, will christen the boat by breaking a bottle of sparkling wine across the bow. Sandberg is the founder and chair of the Sandberg Goldberg Bernthal Family Foundation, a nonprofit organization that works to build a more equal and resilient world through three key initiatives: LeanIn.org, OptionB.org, and the Dave Goldberg Scholarship Program.

"The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has been influential in our nation's culture and continues to play a prominent role in history, higher education, science, research and technology," said Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro. "Nearly eight decades later, I am proud to see Massachusetts' legacy continue, this time as a future attack submarine."

The future USS Massachusetts (SSN 798) is the ninth U.S. Navy vessel named in recognition of the state. The first USS Massachusetts was a steamer built in 1845 and acquired by the U.S. War Department in 1847 to use as a transport vessel during the Mexican-American War. Prior to SSN 798, the last USS Massachusetts (BB-59) was commissioned in 1942 as a South Dakota-class fast battleship. It spent most of its career in the Pacific, decommissioning in 1947.

Virginia-class submarines are built to operate in the world's littoral and deep waters while conducting antisubmarine warfare; anti-surface ship warfare; strike warfare; special operations forces support; intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance; irregular warfare; and mine warfare missions. Their inherent stealth, endurance, mobility, and firepower directly enable them to support five of the six maritime strategy core capabilities — sea control, power projection, forward presence, maritime security and deterrence. These capabilities allow the submarine force to contribute to regional stability and preservation of future peace while operating everywhere international law allows, so everyone else can too.


