

SILENT RUNNING FEBRUARY LOST BOATS

"I can assure you that they went down fighting and that their brothers who survived them took a grim toll of our savage enemy to avenge their deaths." Vice Admiral Charles A. Lockwood, USN







USS Barbel (SS-316)

Lost on Feb 4, 1945 with the loss of 81 officers and men on her 4th war patrol. Based on Japanese records, she was bombed near the southern entrance to the Palawan Passage. Barbel sent a message reporting that she had been attacked three times by enemy aircraft dropping depth charges and would transmit further information on the following night.







USS Shark I (SS-174)

Lost on Feb 11, 1942 with the loss of 59 officers and men on her 1st war patrol. Shark was the 1st US submarine sunk by enemy surface craft in the Pacific. She was most likely sunk by depth charges.





USS Amberjack (SS-219)

Lost on Feb 16, 1943 with the loss of 72 officers and men on her 3rd war patrol. Off Rabaul, she was attacked by a Japanese patrol plane, attacked by a torpedo boat and then depth charged by a subchaser. She reported having been forced down on the 13th by two destroyers, and that she had recovered an enemy aviator from the water and taken him prisoner. All further messages to the vessel remained unanswered.







USS Grayback (SS-208)

Lost on Feb 27, 1944 with the loss of 80 officers and men on her 10th war patrol. She appears to have been caught on the surface in the East China Sea by a Japanese carrier plane whose bombs made a direct hit. During this patrol she sank 4 ships totaling 21,594 tons and was tied for 11th in the number of ships sunk.






USS Trout (SS-202)

Lost on Feb 29, 1944 with the loss of 81 officers and men on her 11th war patrol. She was sunk by escorts in the middle of the Philippines Basin after sinking a passenger-cargoman and damaging another in a convoy. She carried out several notable special missions, including carrying over two tons of gold bullion out of Corregidor in February 1942. Trout topped off with fuel at Midway and was never heard from again. Japanese records indicate that one of their convoys was attacked by a submarine on 29 February 1944 in the area assigned to Trout. Possibly one of the convoy's escorts sank the Trout.



The New Pastor

He asked people for change to buy food because he was hungry. Not one gave him anything.

He went into the sanctuary to sit down in the front of the church and was told by the ushers that he would need to get up and go sit n the back of the church. He said hello to people as they walked in but was greeted with cold stares and dirty looks from people looking down on him and judging him.

He sat in the back of the church and listened to the church announcements for the week. He listened as new visitors were welcomed into the

church that morning but no one acknowledged that he was new. He watched people around him continue to look his way with stares that said you are not welcome here.

Then the elders of the church went to the podium to make the announcement. They said they were excited to introduce the new pastor of the church to the congregation. "We would like to introduce you to our new Pastor." The congregation stood up and looked around clapping with joy and anticipation. The homeless man sitting in the back stood up and started walking down the aisle.

That's when all the clapping stopped and the church was silent. With all eyes on him....he walked up the altar and reached for the microphone. He stood there for a moment and then recited so elegantly, a verse from the bible.....

"Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. He then dismissed service until the following Sunday as his sermon had been given.

Newest USS New Jersey ready to make its debut as the 1943 model goes home (msn.com)

As the newest USS New Jersey prepares to make its formal debut off the state's coastline, its predecessor is nearing a return to its birthplace

In early 2024, the World War II-era battleship USS New Jersey is due to make a short voyage along the Delaware River from Camden to the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard dry dock, where it was made in the early 1940s. Launched for service on Dec. 7, 1943, the floating museum will again be dry-docked, this time for inspection and maintenance.

"The Battleship New Jersey is an incredible piece of history that has traveled the world and aided our military during some of this country's most unstable times, like World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War," Louis Cappelli Jr., director of the Camden County Board of Commissioners, said in 2023. "Even years after its decommissioning, the battleship plays an important part in our community here in Camden County, and preserving it is something we needed to prioritize."

The maintenance project is being funded through a \$5 million contribution from the New Jersey Historical Commission and a \$3.25 million loan from the Camden County Improvement Authority to the association behind the Battleship New Jersey Museum and Memorial, the nonprofit Home Port Alliance. The well-preserved ship, nicknamed Big J, brings about 80,000 visitors a year to its Camden home. Museum ticket sales are due to fund the loan's repayment.

The ship was one of four lowa-class battleships, the last battleships commissioned by the U.S. Navy. All be-

came museums. The USS New Jersey, which opened to the public in Camden in October 2001, is the most decorated. It earned 19 battle and campaign stars during a term of service that included World War II, the Korean War, the Cold War and the Gulf War.

The ship is 887 feet long and displaces more than 60,000 tons of water. Its listed top speed is 33 knots, or nearly 38 mph. When the ship was built, it was cutting-edge. The lowa class was a culmination of the battle-ship era and was meant to counter Japan's massive battleships with superior speed and firepower. Ultimately the platform proved less useful than the similarly sized Essex class of aircraft carriers. After the Cold War, the battleship was deemed superfluous.

The U.S. Navy moved toward submarines. Currently boasting about 50 nuclear-powered attack submarines, U.S. Navy officials plan to boost numbers to at least 60. Among the new ships is the new USS New Jersey. Named in 2015 and launched in 2022, the submarine is due to be commissioned into the fleet during an April 6 ceremony at Naval Weapons Station Earle in Monmouth County. Tickets are available through Jan. 15 from the USS New Jersey Commissioning Committee.

The ship will be the third naval vessel named after the state in the U.S. naval service. The first was a Virginiaclass battleship built in Quincy, Massachusetts, commissioned in May 1906. About half the length of its namesake battleship, the original USS New Jersey mostly existed as a deterrent before becoming a training ship during World War I. After the war, it transported troops home from Europe before being destroyed in September 1923 during U.S. Army bombing tests.

First Look At Columbia Missile Submarine's X-Shaped Stern

The first Columbia class submarine stern section has been delivered to General Dynamics Electric Boat. The massive component will serve as the propulsion section of the inaugural <u>Columbia-class nuclear ballistic missile submarine</u>.

The stern section was shipped aboard Holland - GDEB's 400-foot barge - for the 400-mile journey from Newport News to GDEB's Quonset Point, Rhode Island shipyard. It arrived there last week.

The images show the Columbia class's distinctive x-shaped stern configuration, the first one designed for a U.S. submarine in six decades, with the USS Albacore featuring it back the 1960s. The configuration provides enhanced maneuverability, efficiency, and safety, as well as acoustic signature reductions across major parts of the submarine's operating envelope compared to the current cruciform system used on existing American submarines. The x-stern configuration has becoming increasingly popular and is now found on other submarine designs around the globe.

The Columbia class is designed to be the largest and most complex submarine ever procured by the Navy, <u>according to the Government Accountability Office</u> (GAO). The Navy is planning to spend \$132 billion on the program and GDEB has a target of delivering the first one in April 2027, according to the GAO. It is the

first new ballistic missile submarine the Navy has built since the 1990s.

Because the current Cold War-era Ohio class boats will begin to retire in 2027, the Navy wants the USS District of Columbia to be on patrol by October 2030. There has been talk of <u>extending the life of some of the Ohio</u> class SSBNs in oder to accommodate more slippage in this schedule.

To ensure an uninterrupted presence of the undersea component of the nuclear triad, the Navy has made the Columbia class its priority. As we wrote previously, that has impacted the production of its Virginia class fast attack submarines. GDEB, which is producing those submarines as well, has 17 Virginia class boats in its current backlog delivering through 2032, according to Reuters.

Given the importance of the program, the Navy is working to make sure that the Columbia class stays on track throughout the production process. The sea service is working to accelerate the remaining construction work on the District of Columbia to brace for potential delays in the boat's testing later this decade, <u>Defense News reported in October</u>.

The Navy and GDEB originally built a six-month buffer into the construction schedule, the publication reported, but that has eroded due to "pandemic-related challenges and contractor performance," according to Defense News. There has been other issues with the program, including <u>issues with poor welds</u> on missile tubes for the boats.

Still, the Navy has confirmed the District of Columbia is still "on its contractually mandated schedule," Defense News reported.

We've reached out to the Navy and GDEB for more details.


The delivery of the District of Columbia's stern section is a positive sign for a vital Navy procurement program. We will continue to monitor it as it progresses.

Navy fires captain of guided missile submarine for 'loss of confidence'

The captain of a guided missile submarine, the USS Georgia, was fired from the position, the service announced on Monday, due to "a loss of confidence in his ability to command."

Navy Capt. Geoffry Patterson was relieved as the commanding officer of the Georgia's Blue Crew by Navy

Rear Adm. Thomas "T.R." Buchanan on Jan. 12. according to a Navy news release.

"Capt. Geoffry Patterson was relieved from command and an investigation is being conducted," said Navy Lt. Spencer Marion, a spokesman for Submarine Group Ten. "As a matter of policy, the Navy does not comment on ongoing investigations and does not speculate on any administrative and/or disciplinary actions."

Patterson originally joined the Navy as an enlisted sailor, rising to command on both the Georgia and the USS Maryland. <u>Guided missile submarines</u> have two full crews that alternate manning the boats, each designated by a color.

The Navy has four guided missile submarines, all of which were originally Ohio-class ballistic missile submarines, but were converted to non-nuclear capable boats. The Georgia was converted in 2007. Each guided missile boat can carry up to 154 Tomahawk land-attack cruise missiles and train to deliver special operations forces on covert missions.

"Navy commanding officers are held to high standards of personal and professional conduct," the news release says. "They are expected to uphold the highest standards of responsibility, reliability, and leadership, and the Navy holds them accountable when they fall short of those standards."

So far, Navy officials have not provided a specific reason for Patterson's relief. The phrase "loss of confidence" is a euphemism commonly used by the military branches when leaders are fired that avoids providing an exact reason why. Media outlets can submit a Freedom of Information Act request to find out more information about reliefs of command, but the process can take months, if not longer.

Originally from Chicago, Patterson assumed command of the USS Georgia's Blue Crew in May 2022, according to the Defense Visual Information Distribution Service.

He graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering and naval science, and he later earned a master's degree from the U.S. Naval War College in national security and strategic studies.

USS Georgia is now commanded by Navy Capt. Christopher Osborn, commanding officer of the boat's Gold Crew, the Navy's news release says.

Inside the World's First \$3 Billion Luxury Super Submarine

Blending <u>superyacht</u> luxury with <u>submarine</u> stealth, the Austrian-designed Migaloo M5 promises to redefine maritime living but at a cost that'll burn a hole through your pocket. While the M5 has yet to set sail, Migaloo, the company responsible for the M5, is calling the vessel the world's first luxury super submarine. Billed as the "future of yachting," this high-end hybrid vessel will be capable of four-week underwater voyages, thus offering unprecedented security and secluded exploration, making it an ideal haven for discerning adventurers and <u>rich billionaires</u>.

According to <u>Air Mail</u>, the submersible is set to be an impressive 541 feet in length, capable of fitting 20 passengers and 40 crew members while diving to depths of 250 meters. Onboard, there's a ton of stuff to keep you entertained – think jet skiing, kite surfing, paddle boarding, and even exploring with one of two minisubmarines or catching a helicopter ride.

Adding to its allure, the M5 will also feature two pools, a jacuzzi, and a cafe. For culinary delights, the vessel offers a 36-seat dining room with glass walls, providing guests with spectacular views of the sea and marine life. And if that's not enough, you can amp up your experience with extras like a swimming pool, wine cellar, or cinema, though these come at an extra cost. All this luxury comes with a hefty price tag – the Migaloo M5 is estimated to cost around AUD \$3 billion for construction alone, without even adding those optional bells and whistles.

Despite pitching the Migaloo M5 over the past several months, CEO Christian Gumpold has faced challenges in attracting buyers, with safety remaining a major concern, particularly after the Titan submersible tragedy in June last year. Acknowledging this challenge, Gumpold stated that the company is aiming for "visionary billionaires with or without existing superyacht experience who have extraordinary demands for exclusivity, safety, adventure." He further added that Migaloo is "in negotiations with a number of interested parties from all over the world who are motivated to own the world's first superyacht-submarine hybrid."

"As it is a completely new development, such a project will require corresponding monetary resources, take a lot of time for design, construction and building and demand many decisions," Gumpold told <u>The Times</u>. "However, the owner also receives the corresponding prestige and unimagined new possibilities when calling this product his own. Our target group must be aware of this and have the corresponding innovative mindset."

While Migaloo M5 surely offers a luxurious bunker-like experience beneath the waves, its invulnerability will surely be questioned, with safety features likely analyzed by prospective buyers. With a whopping upwards of AUD \$3 billion price tag, the M5 will have a lot to prove in terms of safety, but Migaloo remains confident its vessel is secure. The company promises maximum protection with a double-hull construction and a range of rescue systems, including mini-submarines.

This Month in History

2/01/1902 – USS *Plunger* (SS-2), the lead ship of the Plunger-class submarine, launches. She is commissioned Sept. 19, 1903, at the Holland Company yard at New Suffolk, Long Island, N.Y. Ensign Chester W. Nimitz is the submarines final commander when *Plunger* is decommissioned Nov. 6, 1909 at the Charleston Navy Shipyard.

2/01/1944 – Three US Navy submarines, *Guardfish* (SS-217), *Hake* (SS-256) and *Seahorse* (SS-304), attack Japanese convoys, sinking a destroyer, cargo ship and another vessel.

2/02/1942 – USS Seadragon (SS-194) sinks Japanese army cargo ship Tamagawa Maru.

2/04/1942 – While the battle for Bataan rages throughout the night, USS Trout (SS-202) loads 20 tons of gold bars and 18 tons of silver coins as ballast to replace the weight of ammunition they had just delivered to US and Philippine forces in Manila.

2/05/1944 – USS Flasher (SS 249) sinks Japanese army cargo ship Taishin Maru off Mindoro. Also on this date, USS Narwhal (SS 167) lands 45 tons of ammunition and cargo to support Filipino guerrilla operations at Libertad, Panay, Philippines.

2/06/1945 – U.S. Navy submarine USS Pampanito (SS 383) attacks a Japanese convoy and sinks merchant tanker Engen Maru about 200 miles northeast of Singapore. Also on this date, USS Spadefish (SS 411) sinks Japanese merchant passenger-cargo ship Shohei Maru off Port Arthur, Korea.

2/07/1943 – USS Growler (SS 215) fights a desperate night battle with the Japanese supply ship Hayasaki, during which the boat's commanding officer, Lt. Cmdr. Howard W. Gilmore, rams the enemy ship, badly bending Growler's bow. Wounded by machine gun fire and unable to go below, Gilmore gives the order "Take her down!" sacrificing himself so his submarine could dive to safety. For his "distinguished gallantry and valor" on this occasion and earlier in the patrol, he is posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor and promoted one rank.

2/07/1945 – USS Thomason (DE 203) sinks the Japanese submarine RO 55 off Iba, Luzon. USS Bergall (SS

- 320) attacks a Japanese convoy and sinks Coast Defense Vessel No. 53 off Cam Ranh Bay. USS Guavina (SS 362) attacks a Japanese convoy and sinks merchant tanker Taigyo Maru, off Saigon, French Indochina while USS Parche (SS 384) sinks Japanese army cargo ship Okinoyama Maru in Tokara Retto.
- 2/08/1942 A Japanese destroyer sinks after being torpedoed by Navy submarine S37 (SS 142) the day before off Makassar.
- 2/08/1943 USS Snook (SS 279) attacks a Japanese convoy off the west coast of Kyushu and sinks the transport Lima Maru and survives depth charges about 30 miles southeast of Goto Retto.
- 2/09/1960 USS Sargo (SSN 583) becomes the third submarine to surface through the ice at the North Pole.
- 2/10/1943 USS Pickerel (SS 177) sinks Japanese freighter Amari Maru off Sanriku.
- USS Pogy (SS 266) attacks a Japanese convoy and sinks destroyer Minekaze and freighter Malta Maru 85 miles north-northeast of Formosa.
- 2/10/1943 USS Pogy (SS 266) attacks a Japanese convoy and sinks destroyer Minekaze and freighter Malta Maru 85 miles north-northeast of Formosa.
- 2/10/1943 U.S. Navy submarine USS Batfish (SS 310) sinks three enemy submarines from Feb. 10-13.
- 2/11/1944 USS Gudgeon (SS 211) sinks Japanese freighter Satsuma Maru that was previously damaged by Chinese B-25s off Wenchow, China.
- 2/12/1945 USS Hawkbill (SS 366) sinks the small Japanese cargo vessel Kisaragi Maru and the two large boats she is towing, at Lombok Strait, N.E.I.
- 2/12/1947 The first launch of a guided missile, the Loon, takes place on board USS Cusk (SS 348).
- 2/13/1945 USS Sennet (SS 408) is damaged by gunfire of Japanese gunboat (No.8 Kotoshiro Maru or No.3 Showa Maru), east of Tanega Shima, but then Sennett sinks No.8 Kotoshiro Maru after it had been shelled by USS Lagarto (SS 371) and USS Haddock (SS 231). Haddock then sinks No.3 Showa Maru, which had already been shelled by Lagarto and Sennett.
- 2/14/1945 USS Gato (SS 212) sinks Japanese Coast Defense Vessel No.9 in the Yellow Sea and USS Hawkbill (SS 366) sinks Japanese auxiliary submarine chasers Cha 4 and Cha 114 in the Java Sea.
- 2/15/1943 USS Gato (SS 212) sinks Japanese stores ship Suruga Maru in Bougainville Strait and USS Pickerel (SS 177) attacks a Japanese convoy and sinks cargo vessel Tateyama Maru off the east coast of Honshu.
- 2/16/1944 USS Skate (SS 305) sinks the Japanese light cruiser Agano as she deploys from Truk, Caroline Islands.
- 2/19/2005 Fast Attack Submarine USS Jimmy Carter (SSN 23) is commissioned.
- 2/20/1945 USS Pargo (SS 264) sinks Japanese destroyer Kokaze off Cape Varella, French Indochina and survives counter-attack by destroyer Kamikaze, which had been steaming in company with Nokaze during the attack.
- 2/21/1942 USS Triton (SS 201) sinks Japanese merchant cargo vessel Shokyu Maru in the East China Sea, 60 miles south of Quelpart Island.
- 2/22/1945 USS Becuna (SS 319) sinks Japanese merchant tanker Nichiyoku Maru off Cape Padaran Bay despite the presence of two escort vessels.
- 2/24/1945 USS Lagarto (SS 371) sinks Japanese submarine I 371 and freighter Tatsumomo Maru off Bungo Strait, Kyushu.
- 2/25/1944 USS Hoe (SS 258) attacks a Japanese convoy at the mouth of Davao Gulf, sinking the fleet tanker Nissho Maru and damaging the fleet tanker Kyokuto Maru, while USS Rasher (SS 269) sinks Japanese army cargo ship Ryusei Maru and freighter Tango Maru off the north coast of Bali.
- 2/27/1945 Submarine USS *Scabbardfish* (SS-397) sinks Japanese guardboat No. 6 Kikau Maru, 100 miles northeast of Keelung, Formosa, while USS *Blenny* (SS-324) attacks a Japanese convoy off French Indochina and sinks merchant tanker Amato Maru off Cape Padaran.
- 2/27/1944 Three U.S. Navy submarines sink three Japanese cargo ships: *Grayback* (SS-208) sinks *Ceylon Maru* in the East China Sea; *Cod* (SS-224) sinks *Taisoku Maru* west of Halmahera while *Trout* (SS-202)

sinks Aki Maru.

2/27/2017 – The Los Angeles-class fast-attack submarine USS Albuquerque (SSN-706) is decommissioned after 33 years of service during a ceremony held at Keyport Undersea Museum.

2/28/1944 – USS Balao (SS 285) and USS Sand Lance (SS 381) sink Japanese army cargo ship Akiura Maru, transport Shoho Maru about 90 miles northwest of Manokawari, New Guinea and transport Kaiko Maru just east of Musashi Wan, off Paramushir, Kurils.

2/29/1992 – Fast Attack Submarine USS Jefferson City (SSN 759) is commissioned.

Though they never figured out how to operate the complex flushing procedure for the head, the nuns did learn how to play cribbage. The four "Submarine Sisters" of St. Joseph of Orange returned to the Solomons after the war.

<u>#OnThisDay</u> in 1960, U.S. Navy Lieutenant Don Walsh and Swiss oceanographer Jacques Piccard descended almost seven miles (35,800 feet) inside bathyscaphe Trieste to reach the Challenger Deep, the deepest point in the world's oceans. The deep-diving decent remains one of the most significant events in deep submergence history.

Trieste's landing on the ocean floor stirred up so much silt that Walsh and Piccard could see little to nothing out of the pressure sphere's observation window. Walsh described it as "like looking into a bowl of milk."

For more than five decades after Walsh and Piccard's historic dive, no human returned to the Challenger Deep. Then in the last 12 years, 25 people have made the seven-mile journey! Filmmaker James Cameron made the trip in 2012, followed by undersea explorer Victor Vescovo in 2019. Between 2019 and 2022, twenty-three other individuals have also reached the Challenger Deep, most through Vescovo, including Don Walsh's son Kelly in 2020.


