SILENT RUNNING DECEMBER LOST BOATS

"I can assure you that they went down fighting and that their brothers who survived them took a grim toll of our savage enemy to avenge their deaths." Vice Admiral Charles A. Lockwood, USN





USS Capelin (SS-289)

Lost on Dec 2, 1943 with the loss of 76 men. She was on her 1st war patrol, but her exact location and cause of loss remain a mystery. She may have been lost to mines or an operational casualty.





USS Sealion (SS-195)

Lost on Dec 10, 1941 with the loss of 5 men. To prevent her from falling into enemy hands, she was scuttled in Manila Bay after incurring severe bomb damage during the initial Japanese attack. The destruction of the Navy Yard made repairs impossible, and Sealion was ordered destroyed. All salvagable equipment was taken off, depth charges were placed inside, and the explosives were set off to prevent her from being made useful to the enemy.




USS F1 / Carp (SS-20)

Lost on December 17, 1917 with the loss of 19 officers and men when it was sunk after collision with the USS F-3 (Pickerel) (SS-22) off San Clemente, CA. While maneuvering in exercises at sea, F-1 and F-3 collided, the former sinking in 10 seconds, her port side torn forward of the engine room. 19 of her men were lost, while 3 others were rescued by the submarines with whom she was operating.



USS S-4 (SS-109)

Lost on December 17, 1927 with the loss of 40 officers and men when it was sunk after being rammed by USCG Paulding. Salvaged in 1928 and re-commissioned.

On 24 November 1945 Menhaden broke the flag of Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, CINCPAC and CINCPOA. Fleet Admiral Nimitz had selected Menhaden as his flagship during Change of Command ceremonies, for she combined the new with the old. Although untried in combat, she was one of the newest boats in the Submarine Service and incorporated the latest improvements in submarine design and equipment. Moreover her "gallantly battle-tested" crew epitomized the "valor, skill, and dedicated service of submariners" during the long Pacific war. Thus, on her deck that morning Fleet Admiral Nimitz read his orders assigning him to duty as Chief of Naval Operations, and his relief, Adm. Raymond A. Spruance, read orders making him CINCPAC and CINPOA.

The Legacy of USS Flasher (SS-249) in World War II

The USS Flasher (SS-249) was a Gato-class submarine that played a pivotal role in the Pacific Theater of World War II. Commissioned on September 25, 1943, the vessel exemplified the engineering excellence and strategic prowess of the United States Navy.

Under the command of Lieutenant Commander Reuben T. Whitaker, the Flasher embarked on its maiden war patrol in January 1944. Operating near Mindoro, Philippines, the submarine quickly established its reputation. On its first patrol alone, the Flasher sunk several enemy vessels. These vessels included the 2900 ton gunboat Yoshida Maru, the 1723-ton freighter Taishin Maru, and two additional cargo ships. These early successes foreshadowed the Flasher's record-breaking achievements.

The Flasher's second patrol in early 1944 saw it return to the South China Sea, off the coast of what was then

French Indochina (now Vietnam). This was a critical area for Japanese maritime logistics. Here, Flasher targeted convoys transporting troops, fuel, and supplies. This patrol includes sinkings of two ships, a freighter and a cargo ship, of around 1000 tons each.

By its third patrol, the Flasher had cemented its reputation as a deadly adversary. During this mission, it sank multiple Japanese freighters and tankers, disrupting vital supply chains. These sinkings includes significant tonnage, including the merchant tanker Otoriyama Maru (5280 tons) and the freighter Koto Maru (3557 tons), and the freighter Nippo Maru (6079 tons). She also damaged a passenger/cargo ship (unspecified name).

Flasher also directly engaged the Japanese navy on the third patrol. Engaging a cruiser and destroyer escort, Flasher attacked both, sinking the cruiser. A counterattack by the destroyer ensued, with Flasher successfully evading depth charge attacks.

On its fourth patrol, operating near Luzon Strait in a wolf-pack with the USS Hawkbill and USS Becuna, Flasher conducted lifeguard duty in preparation for the invasion of The Philippines. Despite being on lifeguard duty, Flasher still managed three sinkings during this patrol – the Saigon Maru (5350 tons, 9/18), the transport/hospital ship Ural Maru (6374 tons, 9/27) and cargo ship Taibin Maru (6886 tons, 10/4).

The Flasher's fifth patrol in late 1944 was particularly fruitful, as it ventured into the East China Sea, sinking several high-tonnage vessels. Among these were oil tankers critical to Japan's war effort, further exacerbating the fuel shortages that plagued Japanese forces in the latter stages of the war. On December 4th, she sunk the Hakko Maru (10,022 tons) and an accompanying escort destroyer. On December 21, Flasher inflicted severe damage on the Japanese war effort, encountering a tanker convoy and sinking the tankers Omurosan Maru (9204 tons), Otowasan Maru (9204 tons) and the Arita Maru (10,238 tons). The latter vessel was the largest sunk by Flasher during the war.

As a result of its efforts from its previous patrols, there were few encounters with Japanese vessels on Flasher's sixth war patrol. Instead, Flasher demonstrated her versatility by laying mines near enemy harbors while simultaneously engaging in aggressive attacks on merchant shipping. Her only sinking on this patrol was the 850-ton cargo vessel Koho Maru. Flasher was proceeding to her seventh war patrol when news of the Japanese surrender was received.

The success of the USS Flasher was not merely the result of technological superiority; it was a testament to the tactical ingenuity of its commanders and the cohesion of its crew. The crew's training ensured quick response times, particularly during tense encounters with enemy destroyers tasked with anti-submarine warfare.

By the end of its operational service, the Flasher had sunk an extraordinary total of 100,231 tons of enemy shipping. This achievement earned it the distinction of being the most successful U.S. submarine of World War II in terms of tonnage sunk. Its contributions were celebrated in naval circles, and its record remains a testament to the effectiveness of submarine warfare in crippling enemy supply lines during the conflict.

The submarine and its crew earned numerous commendations. Flasher received Presidential Unit Citations for each of her third, fourth and fifth war patrols, as well as six battle stars, one for each patrol. Individual crew members were decorated for their bravery and skill under fire.

After the war, the USS Flasher was decommissioned on March 16, 1946 and struck from the Naval Vessel Register. She was memorialized by placing her conning tower at the National Submarine Memorial in Groton, CT.

The USS Flasher epitomized the effectiveness of submarine warfare during World War II. From its design as a Gato-class submarine to its record-breaking wartime achievements, she was a cornerstone of the U.S. Navy's efforts in the Pacific. Its legacy continues to be celebrated by historians and naval enthusiasts alike, ensuring that its story of courage and tactical brilliance remains a beacon of inspiration for future generations.



The Arrow and the Song

I shot an arrow into the air, It fell to earth; I knew not where; For, so swiftly it flew, the sight Could not follow it in its flight.

I breathed a song into the air, It fell to earth; I knew not where; For who has sight so keen and strong, That it can follow the flight of song?

Long, long afterward, in an oak I found the arrow, still unbroke; And the song, from beginning to end, I found again in the heart of a friend.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, a prominent figure in American literature, is celebrated for his accessible and evocative poetry. "The Arrow and the Song," one of his shorter works, encapsulates his talent for blending simple language with profound meaning. This poem explores the enduring impact of our actions and words, using the metaphorical imagery of an arrow and a song.

In "The Arrow and the Song," Longfellow presents a metaphorical journey of two actions: shooting an arrow and singing a song. The poem is structured in three quatrains with a consistent ABAB rhyme scheme, lending it a rhythmic and lyrical quality.

The first stanza describes the speaker shooting an arrow into the air, only to lose sight of it. This symbolizes the physical actions we take, whose outcomes we cannot always predict or immediately observe. The arrow represents the direct, often tangible deeds that can have unforeseen consequences.

The final stanza reveals the lasting nature of both the arrow and the song. The arrow is found intact in an oak tree, and the song is discovered in the heart of a friend. The oak tree symbolizes strength and endurance, suggesting that our actions can leave long-lasting impressions. Finding the song in the heart of a friend emphasizes the profound and enduring impact that words and emotions can have on others.

Longfellow's "The Arrow and the Song" is a reflective meditation on the far-reaching effects of our actions and expressions. The poem invites readers to consider the lasting impacts of what they do and say, encouraging mindfulness and awareness of the influence one can have on the world and those around them.

Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer

Wow, I had no idea about the original story of Rudolph the Red-Nose Reindeer! If you aren't familiar with it either, read below:

As the holiday season of 1938 came to Chicago, Bob May wasn't feeling much comfort or joy. A 34-year-old ad writer for Montgomery Ward, May was exhausted and nearly broke. His wife, Evelyn, was bedridden, on the losing end of a two-year battle with cancer. This left Bob to look after their four-year old-daughter, Barbara.

One night, Barbara asked her father, "Why isn't my mommy like everybody else's mommy?" As he struggled to answer his daughter's question, Bob remembered the pain of his own childhood. A small, sickly boy, he was constantly picked on and called names. But he wanted to give his daughter hope, and show her that being different was nothing to be ashamed of. More than that, he wanted her to know that he loved her and would always take care of her. So he began to spin a tale about a reindeer with a bright red nose who found a special place on Santa's team. Barbara loved the story so much that she made her father tell it every night before bedtime. As he did, it grew more elaborate. Because he couldn't afford to buy his daughter a gift for Christmas, Bob decided to turn the story into a homemade picture book.

In early December, Bob's wife died. Though he was heart-broken, he kept working on the book for his daughter. A few days before Christmas, he reluctantly attended a company party at Montgomery Ward. His co-workers encouraged him to share the story he'd written. After he read it, there was a standing ovation. Everyone wanted copies of their own. Montgomery Ward bought the rights to the book from their debt-ridden employee. Over the next six years, at Christmas, they gave away six million copies of Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer to shoppers. Every major publishing house in the country was making offers to obtain the book. In an incredible display of good will, the head of the

department store returned all rights to Bob May. Four years later, Rudolph had made him into a millionaire.

Now remarried with a growing family, May felt blessed by his good fortune. But there was more to come. His brother-in-law, a successful songwriter named Johnny Marks, set the uplifting story to music. The song was pitched to artists from Bing Crosby on down. They all passed. Finally, Marks approached Gene Autry. The cowboy star had scored a holiday hit with "Here Comes Santa Claus" a few years before. Like the others, Autry wasn't impressed with the song about the misfit reindeer. Marks begged him to give it a second listen. Autry played it for his wife, Ina. She was so touched by the line "They wouldn't let poor Rudolph play in any reindeer games" that she insisted her husband record the tune.

Within a few years, it had become the second best-selling Christmas song ever, right behind "White Christmas." Since then, Rudolph has come to life in TV specials, cartoons, movies, toys, games, coloring books, greeting cards and even a Ringling Bros. circus act. The little red-nosed reindeer dreamed up by Bob May and immortalized in song by Johnny Marks has come to symbolize Christmas as much as Santa Claus, evergreen trees and presents. As the last line of the song says, "He'll go down in history."

I WAS A SAILOR ONCE

I liked standing on the bridge at sunrise with salt spray and the ocean wind in my face, the ship beneath me feeling like a living thing as she drove swiftly through the sea.

I liked the sounds of the Navy - the shrill boatswain's pipe, the ship's bell on the quarterdeck, the harsh squawk of the 1MC, and the strong language and laughter of sailors.

I liked Navy vessels; fast destroyers, plodding fleet auxiliaries and amphibs, sleek submarines and steady solid aircraft carriers.

I liked the proud names of Navy ships: Midway, Lexington, Saratoga, Coral Sea, Antietam, Valley Forge...memorials of great battles won and tribulations overcome.

I liked the lean angular names of Navy "tin-cans" and escorts; Dewey, Farragut, Law, McCloy... mementos of heroes who went before us. And the others, San Jose, San Diego, Los Angeles, St. Paul, Chicago...named for our cities.

I liked the tempo of a Navy band blaring through the topside speakers as we stood out to sea

I liked Liberty Call and the spicy scent of a foreign port.

I even liked the all-hands working parties as my ship filled herself with stores and fuel in order to cut ties to the land and carry out her mission anywhere on the globe.

I liked sailors from all parts of the land, we trusted and depended on each other for competence, comradeship, strength and courage. They were "shipmates"; then and forever.

I liked the surge of adventure in my heart, when the word was passed: "Now set the special sea and anchor detail - all hands to quarters for leaving port," and I liked the thrill of sighting home again, with the waving hands of welcome from family and friends waiting pier side.

The work was hard and dangerous; the going rough at times; the parting from loved ones painful, but the companionship of robust Navy laughter, the "all for one and one for all" philosophy of the sea was ever present.

I liked the serenity of the sea after a day of hard ship's work, as flying fish flitted across the wave tops and sunset gave way to night.

I liked the feel of the Navy in darkness -- the masthead and range lights, the red and green navigation lights and stern light, the pulsating phosphorescence of radar repeaters - they cut through the dusk and joined with the mirror of stars overhead. And I liked drifting off to sleep lulled by the myriad of noises that told me that my ship was well, and that my shipmates on watch would keep me safe.

I liked quiet midwatches with the aroma of strong coffee; the lifeblood of the Navy permeating everywhere. And I liked hectic watches when the exacting minuet of haze-gray shapes racing at flank speed kept all hands on a razor edge of alertness.

I liked the sudden cry of "General quarters, general quarters, all hands man your battle stations," followed by the clamor of running feet on ladders and the resounding thump of watertight doors as the ship transformed herself in a few brief seconds from a peaceful workplace to a weapon of war...ready for anything.

And I liked the sight of space-age equipment manned by youngsters clad in dungarees and sound-powered phones that their grandfathers would still recognize.

I liked the traditions of the Navy and those who made them. I liked the proud names of Navy heroes: Halsey, Nimitz, Perry, Farragut, John Paul Jones and Burke. A sailor could find much in the Navy: comrades-in-arms, pride in self and country, mastery of the seaman's trade.

In years to come, when sailors are home from the sea, they will still remember with fondness and respect the ocean in all its moods - the impossible shimmering mirror calm or the storm-tossed green water surging over the bow. And then there will come again a faint whiff of stack gas, a faint echo of engine and rudder orders, a vision of the bright bunting of signal flags snapping at the yardarm, a refrain of hearty laughter in the wardroom and chief's quarters and mess decks.

Gone ashore for good they will grow wistful about their Navy days, when the seas belonged to them and a new port of call was ever over the horizon.

Remembering this, they will stand taller and they will say, "I WAS A SAILOR ONCE AND I WOULD DO IT AGAIN."


